DEBATE IN THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

During October half-term 38 young people from Stockport spent an afternoon in the Council Chamber at the Town Hall in debate with 7 councillors, one from each of Stockport's Area Committees. More than 20 questions were submitted by the young people whose ages ranged from 13 to 19. Some questions related to specific areas of the Borough whilst some were general and covered a variety of services from youth provision to waste disposal and the collection of the new plastic bins. Two young question masters presided well over a debate which was searching but always kept its friendly tone.

After the debate the young people were invited into the committee rooms where a variety of information stalls and games were staffed by the team from Electoral Services.

Stockport Council has thanked everyone who supported the Pakistan Floods Appeal, which helped to raise the profile of the flooding disaster and gave Borough residents the chance to support the victims.

The Mayor of Stockport, Councillor Hazel Lees, said: "I would like to say a big heart felt 'thank you' to everyone who supported the Council's Pakistan Floods Appeal. The way Stockport residents and Council employees supported this appeal to raise much needed funds to help the victims of the floods in Pakistan has been fantastic."

As part of the appeal, the Council urged partners, employees, residents and community groups to organise events to raise funds for the UK Disaster Emergency Committee (DEC).

Fundraising activities included collections at Stockport County and Sale Sharks matches, cake sales, bring and buy sales and dress down days. A cheque for £2,206.50 was donated to UK DEC after all the fundraising events during September by the Council and through bucket collections at community events.

This is the latest in a series of donations to DEC by the Council and partners. Over £500 was donated in August by Council employees, who organised their own fundraising events. Stockport Police and colleagues from the Community Safety Unit raised £867 through a sponsored fast.

Stockport Islamic Centre, Heaton Muslims Community Trust and Cheadle Muslim Association between them raised over £60,000 through collections, donations and a sponsored cycle ride to London. They sent medicines and food parcels to Pakistan through the Pakistan International Airlines appeal where the airline freighted the relief to Pakistan free of charge from Manchester Airport.

2011 Census—coming to a letter box near you

On 27 March 2011 all residential households in the United Kingdom will be taking part in a census. Since 1801 a day has been chosen every ten years for this purpose (except in 1941 during the war). The census provides an excellent source of information about the population. This enables Stockport Council, the government, health authorities and many other organisations to identify need for housing, education, health and transport services for years to come.

The census statistics feed into the allocation of funding for the Borough of Stockport and play a major part in identifying need for local services in communities, so it is crucial the population estimate is as accurate as possible. When the questionnaire envelope comes through the door you'll easily recognise it by the purple 2011 Census logo. Take care of it. If, like many people, you want to complete the questionnaire online, your individual internet code is on the front of the questionnaire.

Did you know that supermarkets use census statistics to work out the kind of foods they need to sell to keep local communities stocked up with their favourites? Water companies use the census data to plan the pipes for clean and wastewater – to make sure there's enough for everyone. Fire brigades and the police use census data to help communities, putting fire alarms and crime prevention measures in specific areas. The benefits are far reaching.

The 2011 Census doesn't want anyone to fall behind – so there is a wide range of help options available (such as language guidance booklets, large print format, Text Relay and census field staff on hand, as well as online help and telephone call centres).

VACANT COMMERCIAL UNITS GRANTS

Over the last two years the UK has seen a sharp rise in the number of vacancies within town centres. In response to this issue Town Centre Management has been working with partners to reduce the amount of vacant units and prevent existing occupied units from becoming vacant.

Stockport Council has introduced a new scheme comprising of premises grants and business grants to businesses and community groups to improve and occupy vacant units.

Initial feedback shows that the scheme has already been successful in attracting new occupants into vacant units in Stockport's Town and District Centres and further funding opportunities are available.

S:PARK DEVELOPMENT OFF TO A FLYING START IN STOCKPORT



Planning permission has been granted for one of the North West's most prominent development sites S:Park Stockport. Work has already started on the high profile 15 acre brownfield site adjacent to junction 1 of the M60, which is a joint development between Helical Bar and Chancerygate.

Two substantial pre-lets have already been secured at the development with Infiniti Nissan, acquiring a two acre plot for its second car showroom in the UK, and Big Yellow, a leading self storage brand, for a new 22,500 sq ft facility.

When completed the S:Park development will create an estimated 600 jobs and planning approval has been secured for 73,000 sq ft trade use, light industrial, distribution and office accommodation. Design and build opportunities and plots of land are both available.

STOCKPORT JOBSFAIR GIVES A BOOST TO JOBSEEKERS

Over 1,000 jobseekers took the opportunity to enhance their career prospects by attending Stockport Jobsfair in September at Stockport Town Hall.

Organised by Stockport Council in partnership with Jobcentre Plus and Connexions, the Jobsfair gave local jobseekers the opportunity to talk to national and local employers, as well as training and skills providers providing advice on finding work or training opportunities.

Support, guidance and seminars were also on offer on topics such as CV preparation, apprenticeships, interview techniques, pre-recruitment training in the Armed Forces and online applications.

NEWS FROM STOCKPORT'S TOWN CENTRE

There was a good turn-out on a very wet October morning for the quarterly meeting of Stockport's Town Centre Management Network (TCMN). After Councillor Kevin Hogg's opening remarks, Graeme Vout reminded the attendees about the switch-on of the Christmas lights and the efforts of a wide range of organisations, groups and individuals who work hard to make sure that the centre of the town remains attractive and vibrant over the festive season.

Liz Madge from the Council's Neighbourhood Renewal Team introduced the Town Centre Economic Research Project which had looked at 1600 residents in 4 separate concentrations of housing within the "Town Centre" area. The purpose was to gain an understanding of the residents' skills levels and the recruitment needs of local employers in order to develop beneficial links between the two groups.

The second major item on the agenda was a short presentation from Graham McKendrick, Employer Services Manager for the National Apprenticeship Service (NAS). Apprenticeships provide on-the-job work-based training which is funded by central government. Graham pointed out that the Comprehensive Spending Review announced the previous day had allocated increased funding to the (NAS)

Members of the Council's Environmental Health and Trading Standards team presented information about regulating the night time economy through Licensing Partnership Working. A very effective partnership has developed between the Police and Stockport Council's Trading Standards Officers who look after behaviour in the Town Centre's pubs and clubs.

HEALTH & WELLBEING PARTNERSHIP

STOCKPORT HEALTH RECORD

NHS Stockport is leading the way in improving patient care and safety by delivering an innovative, information sharing system.

The Stockport Health Record has been set up so doctors at A&E and the Out of Hours service can have access to vital medical details about patients they are seeing. It's meant creating an IT system that allows the sharing of data from GP practices that all use different electronic systems to keep their records. Until it was set up, clinicians had to rely on the patient and their family to remember key information such as which medication they're on and whether they are allergic to any drugs. The availability of the medical records will speed up the process and reduce any risks, meaning the patient has the best possible chance of recovering quickly.

The system went live last November with Stockport's Out of Hours service being the first to benefit from having access to patients' medical records.

So far the records of nearly 250,000 patients are available to be accessed but it's hoped soon everyone will be on board. However if anyone is unhappy about their medical details being shared, they can opt out from the system and have their records held only at their practice.

Further developments in the pipeline include the integration of the system with Stockport Council Adult Services.

FOOD PROJECT COOKS UP A TREAT FOR NURSERIES



If you are what you eat, then children in full-day nursery care in Stockport are well on the way to being perfect. And it's all thanks to a new food project that is helping the nurseries provide their children with the best food possible.

A number of the Borough's nurseries signed up for the project which aims to get all under 5's settled into healthy eating habits that will benefit them for the rest of their lives.

Evidence suggests eating habits are most easily established very early in life so nurseries are critically important at encouraging children to eat sensibly.

The nurseries have been encouraged to provide children with healthy food choices which promote the best habits for future health. Good food choices will help protect children from obesity, heart disease, diabetes, tooth decay and many other chronic diseases later in life.

The project, run jointly by NHS Stockport and Stockport Council, involved nutritional training for nursery staff, computer menu analysis, food sampling and analysis, recipe testing and developing a recipe book, and a Healthy Eating Award for under 5's in day care.

On 23rd September, Stockport LINK (Local Involvement Network) co-hosted an event with the Health & Wellbeing Partnership looking at the health and social care priorities in Stockport which was attended by 152 people.

The event was opened by LINK Chair John Leach, who introduced the day and invited on stage Duncan Weldrake from NHS Stockport to talk about the priority issues for children and young people. Duncan was followed by Jane Rossini who spoke about the priority issues for adults. Mark Warren then spoke about the priorities for older people. Steve Watkins, Director of Public Health summarized the points made during the presentations. Those in attendance, who included LINK members, professionals and members of the public were then given the chance to ask the speakers any questions.

After the question panel, LINK Development Manager Maria Kildunne introduced a video made by LINK members on the contribution of the public and the LINK.

After lunch, attendees were invited to join workshops on the four life stages identified during the presentations and discussions about relevant health and social care issues took place.

LINK member Gerry Wright, who attended the event said, "I thought it was a very well organised event and the idea of getting all the information in the morning followed by public participation in the afternoon meant everybody got their say."

The workshops in the afternoon will be added to the priorities for the Health & Wellbeing Partnership's JSNA work (Joint Strategic Needs Assessment) as well as helping to drive the work of the LINK.

ALL TOGETHER AGAIN



Stockport marked National Older People's Day on 1st October by holding a major consultation and engagement event in the Town Hall led by the All Our Tomorrows Partnership. The event, called All Together Now, was attended by over 200 older people from across the Borough. This event followed on from the very successful All Together Now event held two years ago.

It was opened by the Deputy Mayor of Stockport, Cllr Chris Murphy and introduced by the Leader of the Council, Cllr Dave Goddard.

Both welcomed the event as a very important part of finding out what the local issues are directly from people themselves and an important feed into the design of local services to meet local needs.

People who attended the event took part in four themed workshops:

- Having your say and being heard
- Wellbeing in body and mind
- Knowing your rights and being protected
- Independence, responsibility and risk

Event organisers from Age Concern Stockport noted “The All Our Tomorrows Partnership wanted to explore and understand what people see as their responsibility for aspects of their own lives and then what services or developments people who commission services need to consider and take into account to support those needs and wants.”

The event also included video presentations, a fun Stockport quiz and question and answer sessions with a panel representing the various statutory agencies.

Age Concern Stockport workers are now working hard to analyse all the information gathered and the feedback. When completed this will be sent out to all attendees, and will also be used by the All Our Tomorrows Partnership Board to form part of the older people’s strategy and in turn passed to those who shape services in Stockport.

SAFER STOCKPORT PARTNERSHIP

OPERATION GOTHAM

Police in Stockport have launched a major new awareness campaign, codenamed Operation Gotham, to encourage residents to light up now the nights are darker. Traditionally burglaries increase as the clocks go back, as criminals love the dark and like to target unlit properties.

Officers are using school pupils as junior crime fighters to help keep homes safe. Pupils are asked to take the survey home, assess the security measurements in place and fill in the survey. On completion a parent or guardian signs it.

To help keep burglaries down an advertising van will be travelling around the Borough with crime prevention advice. Vulnerable residents will receive a free light timer and light bulb. Extra police patrols will be on the streets for the next few months. Known offenders will receive letters and personal visits from officers throughout the campaign.

ADULT EDUCATION, SKILLS & EMPLOYABILITY PARTNERSHIP

EMPLOYMENT AND SKILLS ADVICE

Employment & Skills Advisors are employed by Stockport Council to engage with people that are not in work, and not accessing services. They give independent and realistic advice, acting as advocates for individuals and to help them access services to move towards employment. The Advisors work across Stockport's priority neighbourhoods in areas of high worklessness, and have been funded by Stockport Boost until December 2011.



Residents who are low skilled, unemployed or not in work often don't know where to turn to for help or what services are available. This is where the Advisors help. They encourage residents to think about their future career. This could be returning to learning, finding a training course, undertaking volunteering or actively seeking employment. They help people to find their way around the various support services available, focusing on their specific needs and helping to overcome any barriers.

Here's an example of how people are helped:

One person's journey.

A woman from Brinnington had been out of work for 10 years when she first met the advisors. She hadn't had a career and wasn't really sure what she wanted to do or what she was capable of doing.

She met with an advisor on several occasions who found out she often helped out at her son's primary school on a voluntary basis assisting with day trips etc. Together options were explored and she was told about a Teaching Assistant course. She was immediately really interested and so a meeting was arranged with an advisor within the Continuing Education Service.

The client loved the sound of the course but she didn't have any experience so didn't meet the enrolment criteria for the course. So to overcome this some volunteering hours at her son's school was arranged. She is now working towards becoming a qualified Teaching Assistant.

This is just one person's experience. Currently the advisors have over 250 people registered with their service.

NEW YOUTH GROUP STARTS ON A HIGH



Children from the Guywood Estate, in Romiley, enjoyed rock-climbing and archery sessions at Rope Race Climbing Centre, Stockport in August to launch the start of a new youth group. The group was set up to give the children living on the estate the chance to come together and engage in fun activities in a safe environment. It's the first of its kind for the children on the estate, which had no youth facilities. It is hoped that by staging activities young people will have a chance to get involved in something constructive and avoid drifting into less desirable activities.

Adam Bates, Youth Projects Co-ordinator at Guinness Northern Counties, said: "Today's exciting activities have been a great start to what promises to be a very fun and rewarding youth group. We are keen to get as many local young people involved in these activities, which are completely free of charge. HOUSING NEWS IN STOCKPORT

COMPLETION OF THE DECENT HOMES PROGRAMME

All social housing stock owned by the Council and Registered Social Landlord partners in the Borough has now achieved the "decent homes standard".

A total of £105m has been invested by Stockport Homes, the organisation that manages Council owned properties, to improve homes and neighbourhoods across the borough. This milestone follows four years of sustained hard work by the organisation and its contractors. Since 2006, customers have helped shape the planning and delivery of improvement programmes. Involvement has included the prioritisation of areas to begin works and the selection of choices, for example the range of kitchen units, flooring and tiling. Customer satisfaction has continued to improve and currently stands at 95%.

Mossbank Homes, which took over the ownership of Manchester overspill estates in 2006 have also improved over 1,100 properties to meet this standard across eight estates in Stockport at a cost of over £20m. On their transfer from Manchester Council to Mossbank Homes the properties were in need of significant internal and external renovation work.

The properties owned by the other partner housing associations - Guinness Northern Counties, Equity Housing Group, Johnnie Johnson Housing Trust, Harvest Housing and Contour Housing have also met the decent homes standard.

HOUSING BOOST FOR TOWN CENTRE

There is good news for the town centre. Guinness Northern Counties (GNC) have been allocated funding for the redevelopment of the former Vesuvios restaurant on Lower Hillgate.

Together with the adjacent former Strive office they will build 13 flats for intermediate rent or sale. The intention is that the ground floor will be used by Guinness Northern Counties as their local housing office. This scheme will have a major impact on the town centre and will give a new boost to the long term regeneration of the historic Hillgate area.

housing associations to address housing fraud. Stockport Homes has co-ordinated this campaign on behalf of Stockport Council and the Stockport Housing Partnership and is working with Contour Homes, Guinness Northern Counties, Johnnie Johnson Housing Trust, Mossbank Homes, Equity Housing Group and Harvest Housing Group.

In 2009 the government launched a national crackdown on tenancy fraud in social housing. The campaign aims to recover Council and Housing Association homes that are illegally occupied and release them for those in real need.

As part of the crackdown, Communities and Local Government (CLG) made funding available for those authorities willing to work in partnership with

In total there have been 84 tip offs, with 35 of these cases still under investigation. More importantly 12 properties have been recovered and re-let to people in housing need across Stockport following the joint partnership initiative.

Housing fraud can be un-authorized subletting, obtaining housing by deception, wrongly claimed succession or assignment and not using the property as someone's only principal home.
